Academic Vocabulary Words: Activity Ideas

K-2 ideas:

Draw a picture of the word. How many vowels are it the word? How many consonants? Find and cut out examples of the word of the week in newspapers or magazines. Brainstorm a list of other words related to the word. Use the word in a sentence. Write the definition of the word. How many times can you use the word of the week at home this week? Create your own word of the week poster. "Teach" a family member the word of the week. Write an Math question using the Word of the Week. Write an ELA question with the word.

3-6 ideas:

Break the word into syllables. Write three clues, which would help someone to guess the word. Brainstorm a list of other words related to the word. Use the word in a sentence. Draw a picture of the word. Write the definition of the word. Write a list of synonyms for the word. Write a list of antonyms for the word. How does the word of the week relate to a word or words of past weeks? How can you use the word in different subject areas? Give examples. How many times can you use the word of the week at home this week? Create your own word of the week poster. "Teach" a family member the word of the week. Write a Math question using the Word of the Week. Write an ELA question with the word. Find and cut out examples of the word of the week in newspapers or magazines. Make a flash card of the word. Compare how the word is used in ELA to how it is used in Math. Tell me when you have used this word before.

Extra Activity ideas:

★ Students can illustrate the word to be displayed in the class.



★ Students can create their own context clues multiple-choice questions.



★ As a class, make an examples and nonexamples chart or a synonym and antonym chart.
